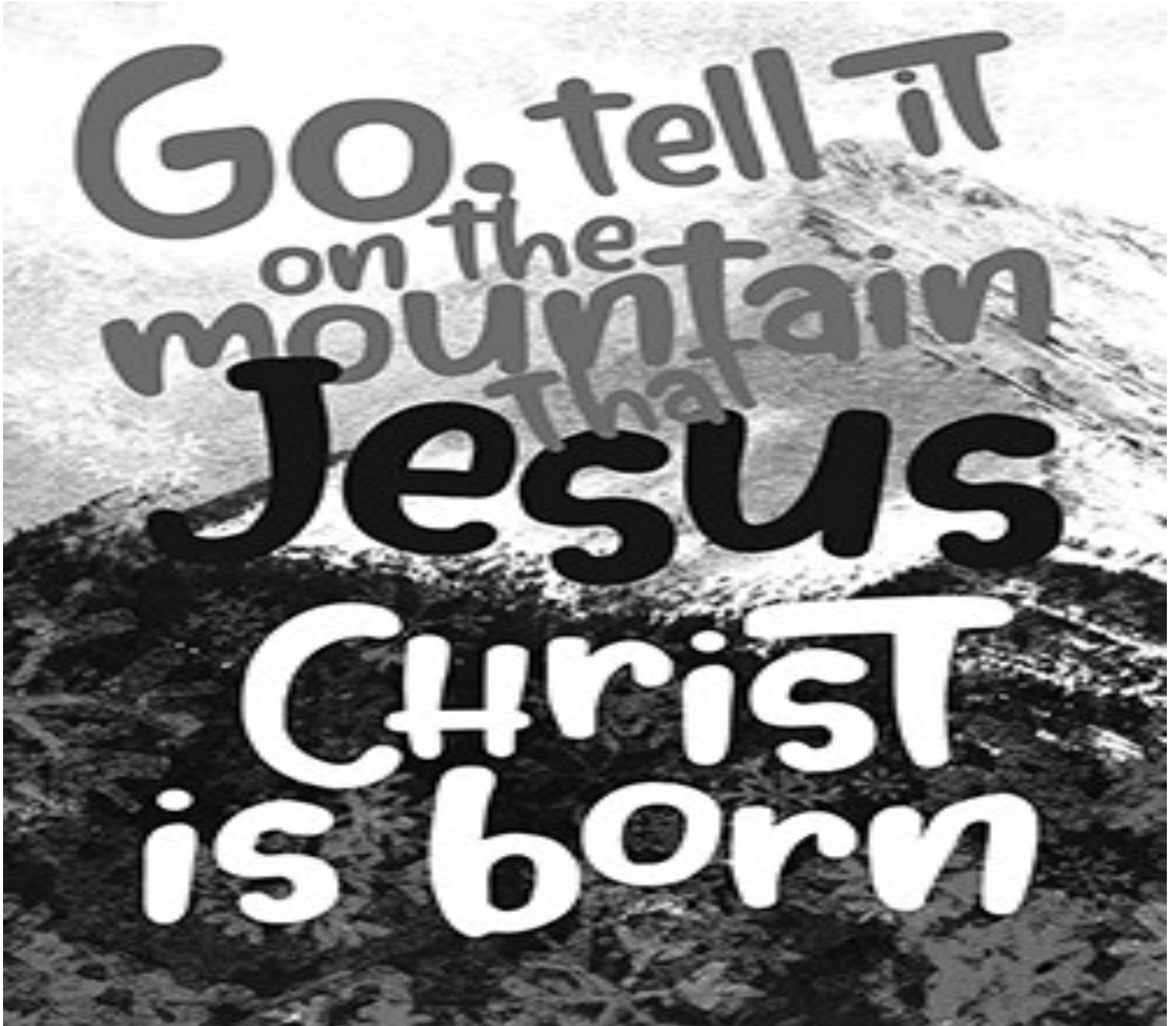

# Pastor's Page



Jennifer Yardley Barney remembers something from Christmas Past she will never forget. It shaped her. Some gifts mean so much. When we receive them, they're amazing, maybe even goose bumpy amazing. Yet, when we're the one who gives them, it's even more than this. We're the light of God's goodness. May we all find in the gift of Christ the reason to live as lamps of love.

She writes: "I knew I was not supposed to be quite so excited. I was too old for that. At age eleven, the oldest and my mom's "grown up" girl, I had to keep my cool. I was in middle school after all. But every chance I got, when I was alone, I checked each present under the tree. I read every tag and felt every package, guessing at the contents within. I had examined each gift so often that I could tell which present went to which person without even looking at the tags.

It had been a tough year for my family. Whenever my mom looked over at the tree and scattered presents, she would sigh and warn us, "There won't be as much for Christmas this year. Try not to be disappointed." Christmas had traditionally been a time for my parents to spoil us. In years past, the presents would pile up and spill out from under the tree, taking over the living room. I had heard the phrase "giving is better than receiving," but thought that whoever had said that must have been out of their mind. Getting presents was the whole point! It was the reason I couldn't get to sleep on Christmas Eve.

On Christmas morning, we eagerly waited in the hallway until Dad told us everything was ready. We rushed into the living room and let the wrapping paper fly. We made weak attempts to wait and watch while other family members opened their presents, but as the time passed we lost our self-control.

"Here's another one for you," said Mom as she handed me a package. I looked at it, confused. Having spent so much time examining the presents before Christmas, I recognized this one. But it had not been mine. It was my mom's. A new label had been put on it, with my name written in my mother's handwriting.

"Mom, I can't..."

I was stopped by my mother's eager, joyful look—a look I could not really understand. "Let's see what it is, honey. Hurry and open it."

It was a blow dryer. Though this may seem but a simple gift, to me it was so much more. Being an eleven-year-old girl, I was stunned. In my world, where receiving outweighed giving by light years, my mom's act of selflessness was incomprehensible. It was a huge act. Tears filled my eyes, and I thought in disbelief about how much my mom must love me to give up her Christmas so I could have a few more presents.

I have always remembered that Christmas fondly. It had such an impact on me. As an adult with children in my life whom I adore, I can now understand my mom's actions. I see how she was not "giving up her Christmas" as I had thought but was finding an even greater joy in her Christmas because giving truly is better than receiving. My mom's simple act meant the world to me."

## News from the Vision Ministry

### Financial Update

In late October we were blessed with a large donation as part of an estate settlement from a member who died before 1996! His widow lived another 10 years but had moved away. We had only been informed of John's death. We came up with approximate date of his widow's death by researching online. We are so grateful for this \$7500 gift! A brass plate to memorialize the wife's death will be added to our Cook Memorial Garden and is ordered - in thanks for their gift. We hope to reinvest at least part of that gift before the year's end, to increase our savings. We have had to use some savings during 2023 to pay expenses, as you read about in previous newsletter articles.

Your 2023 year-end giving statement will be mailed in January to all 120 family units who identify their COTH contributions. Giving via Zelle is a fee-free option. Several families use this monthly recurring way to follow through on their pledges. Thank you for all financial gifts and gifts of your time and talents.

### Lifepoint Church

This very friendly and helpful congregation has been worshipping following our Sunday morning service for seven weeks. In the near future we expect to share with Lifepoint additional areas of our church facilities during the week. Please continue to be warm and welcoming to new folks in our midst who LOVE being able to worship and have their Sunday School program here.

### Land Sale Update

At present, the Vision Ministry has agreed to put a hold on any active marketing of the small piece of land on the west part of our church property. Our finances are much more positive now with recent income from our two visiting churches and of course the preschool.

The sub-team of Bob and Doug have come across historic church documents that may affect how and what can be sold of church property. Since we would want a squeaky-clean title to proceed with any offer, we need to research this history more thoroughly to be clear about what such a process entails. Since

the Florida conference is somewhat involved in how churches can sell property, we need to get solid clarity from that office as well to be sure about our rights as a local church.

We will update you further when we get all the facts. Many thanks to Doug and to Bob for their countless hours for meetings, research, writing reports, and answering questions.

### From Bread and Cup to Faith and Giving Pledge

Watch for your letter and pledge card soon regarding our 2024 pledging campaign, or Stewardship Drive. At this time of year, we continue planning for our programs and ministries going into 2024. Your pledge of financial support, as well as sharing time and talents in volunteering, are all crucial to our church. We need to meet our expenses. Perhaps more importantly we want to pursue additional ways we can continue being a very special church in our community. Help us do that with your loyal support.

### Newsworthy from Fidelity investment company

"A required minimum distribution (RMD) refers to mandatory withdrawals from qualified retirement plans like traditional IRAs that kick in once a saver reaches age 73. Your first RMD deadline is April 1 in the year after you turn 73. **All subsequent RMDs must be taken by December 31.** Missing those deadlines can be costly with a 50% penalty on withdrawals not taken.

Note that if you delay your first RMD until April, you'll have to take 2 RMDs in your first year—and pay taxes on them. The first will still have to be taken by April 1; the second, by December 31."

***Check with your accountant, but you should be able to transfer all or part of RMD funds directly as a gift to a charitable organization - such as Church on the Hill - which prevents your being taxed on that income when it is paid directly to you as an individual taxpayer.  
Sounds like a win-win!***

## 45 Churches of the Florida Conference have opted to sign on to the Pastoral Letter

Church on the Hill is one of the 45 churches that is speaking out on behalf of Educational reprinted here showing the signatures of a few of our members.

## An Open Letter to Our Florida Neighbors

including The Governor, the Education Commissioner, and members of the FL State Legislature

The United Church of Christ (UCC) in Florida has been a part of the faith community in FL since 1884 and a part of our nation since its very beginning. Our faith is rooted in scripture and Jesus' commandment to 'Love our neighbors as we love ourselves' (paraphrase Luke 10:27). Our commitment to education began with our denominational ancestors, who were founders of Harvard College, seminaries and other institutions of higher learning, including six Historically Black Colleges & Universities (HBCU) and more recently, New College.

In addition to supporting institutions of higher learning, we are also invested in supporting our children and youth through public education. It is our love for and our commitment to our children that compels us to write regarding the new education policies being enacted in our state. Again, we follow the words of Jesus, who said, "Let the children alone - let them come to me. the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." (The Inclusive Bible). This is often interpreted as a reminder to value the qualities of children and to be open and accepting towards everyone, regardless of their age or status. It also serves as a call to nurture and protect the young ones, allowing them to grow and develop freely as well as an invitation to welcome the most powerless among us. We believe that love of neighbor means supporting the autonomy of one's faith and education, honoring the dignity of all, and promoting inclusion are ways of defining the beloved community.

To build a beloved community, we must ensure our children are taught the richness and complexities of our collective past, the good as well as the bad. Teaching children a comprehensive understanding of history will foster empathy, critical thinking, and a deeper sense of unity and will empower them to recognize injustice and discrimination and work towards a more equitable future. Yet it seems that our new educational curricula are focused on making students comfortable rather than challenging them to analyze and evaluate. Further, language expressing slavery as a benefit to African Americans is reckless and harmful; in worst cases, leading to acts of violence like what we witnessed in Jacksonville on August 26, 2021.

Moreover, we are concerned about the dropping of the AP African American history curriculum in favor of what seems to be a much less comprehensive one, especially Prager U, which purports only one viewpoint. To build a beloved community, one that embraces all its members, we must acknowledge the struggles, triumphs, and contributions of every individual and community that has

played a part in shaping our state and nation. A beloved community is not built on obtuseness or the erasure of history. It is built on a strong foundation of knowledge, understanding, and respect for one another. By equipping our children with a holistic view of history, we give them the tools to challenge prejudice and bigotry. We create a generation of leaders who recognize the immense value of embracing diversity and promoting social justice.

Furthermore, we are concerned that our policies and rhetoric toward LGBTQ+ students, parents, teachers, and faculty feel targeted and less safe. We are concerned that books lifting up diversity and the struggle for justice have been taken off library shelves, sometimes as a response to self-censorship because of the political atmosphere that has been created. We are concerned that the mission of New College has been changed and new leadership, some without educational credentials, hurriedly put in place. All of these actions threaten the building of the beloved community.

Just as we are asking you, our educational and political leaders, to remember your responsibilities for the educational policies of our state for all our children and to engage with educators, historians, and community leaders to design an inclusive framework that truly reflects the complexities of our shared past! we acknowledge our own responsibility in the education of our children and youth. We re-commit to providing a safe space for children and youth to learn about one another and about the vision for a Beloved Community.

We express our gratitude to our dedicated educators and librarians and commit to supporting them in helping nurture our children and youth. These educational experts care deeply and play a vital role in shaping the future leaders of our society. They inspire, challenge, and open young minds to the wonders of knowledge. But too many of them now feel under attack and are contemplating leaving their profession and/or the state.

Let us work together to create a beloved community where every child grows up with an understanding and appreciation for the diverse tapestry that has been woven throughout history. In the words of Jesus, "Let the children come."

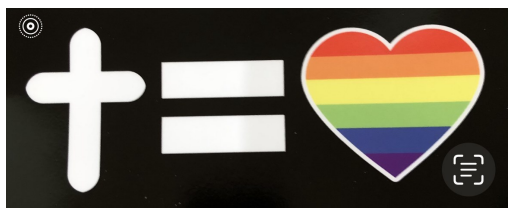

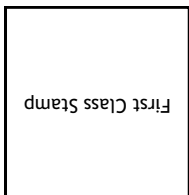
