January 7 Matthew 5:14-16	<b>Got a Light?</b> To represent God and goodness you don't have to be tough, you don't have to be bossy, or mean, willing to take people down who are doing wrong. ### **Team Updates**

#### News from the Vision Ministry

#### Financial Reports:

In late December we were able to invest \$5000 back into our Fidelity "savings" or investment account. This was due to a generous bequest in the Fall. And the memorial plaque has been received and installed on our monument. Earlier in the year we had to liquidate funds several times to pay our expenses. Having new building use fees from the visiting church has also been a great help since mid-October.

### Report of the 23 pledged gifts received as of December 27, 2023:

A total of 95% of pledges have been received, with the final Sunday of the year still to be tabulated. The amount of funds received is \$56,000 out of \$59,000 pledged, or a shortfall of \$3,000. We have a few days in the year to close this gap. A large part of our expenses are covered by building use fees received.

As of this print date for 2024 pledging, 14 giving units or households have made pledges of financial support in the amount of \$54,000, or about 34% of our last year's budget needs. Creation of the new 2024 budget has begun. Thank you to all of you who have pledged already. Each member or friend is encouraged continue to prayerfully consider the opportunity to pledge your support. Your pledge of financial support, as well as sharing time and talents in volunteering, are all crucial to our church. We need to meet our expenses of course. Perhaps more importantly we want to pursue additional ways we can continue being a very special church in our community. Help us do that with your loyal support. Pledge cards are in the Rosser Room year-round.

#### Giving for 2023

Your 2023 year-end giving statement were mailed to 80 families, aka "giving units" who identify their COTH contributions. Anonymous

gifts are certainly always appreciated as well.

#### Repeated (unsolicited) advice:

Newsworthy from Fidelity investment company "A required minimum distribution (RMD) refers to mandatory withdrawals from qualified retirement plans like traditional IRAs that kick in once a saver reaches age 73. Your first RMD deadline is April 1 in the year after you turn 73. All subsequent RMDs must be taken by December 31. Missing those deadlines can be costly with a 50% penalty on withdrawals not taken.

Note that if you delay your first RMD until April, you'll have to take 2 RMDs in your first year— and pay taxes on them. The first will still have to be taken by April 1; the second, by December 31."

Check with your accountant, but you should be able to transfer all or part of RMD funds directly as a gift to a charitable organization - such as Church on the Hill - which prevents your being taxed on that income when it is paid directly to you as an individual taxpayer. Sounds like a winwin!
