 There are so many good videos these days! So I chose 7 to share with you which speak better about what I have learned than I can do on my own. For my study to understand Bible references that might be hurtful to the LGBT community, I watched many You Tube videos, I watched the 4 videoed Bible workshops of Pastor Bernice Powell-Jackson from Tampa UCC, read the transcript from another UCC workshop in Michigan, read the Bible verses in question, interviewed the author and read a book by a gay pastor who was once part of the ex-gay movement, explored other resources that our sub-committee received from the LGBT Open and Affirming Coalition and studied writings by Jeff Newcomb.

My background

- I am so grateful that I was brought up without ever hearing or reading any of these questionable verses. I was raised that God is Love, and all were created in His image, and that All was created GOOD!
- Authors, including many pastors, Gay and straight, who have studied the Bible have written many books reconciling homosexuality and Christianity.

• We will start with a video that is nearly 11 years old, but recaps troubling history in our country; it provides much food for thought. It is a trailer from the feature documentary "For the Bible Tells Me So," which won the Sundance Film Festival and other awards in 2007. It touches on many of the concerns that Dr. Bob Rogers raised in our first seminar about acceptance of everyone, despite a Sexual Orientation that might be different from the typical or mainstream. In the video, see if you recognize a former politician and daughter, among others.

- You can watch the entire documentary "For the Bible Tells Me So" on Netflix or through the Boca Raton Library 's hoopla app.
- I found it so interesting to be able to see in depth how 5 different family units responded to the facts of having a gay son or daughter.

UCC LGBT history

- declaring the denomination ONA in 1985 and encouraging local churches to do the same, and providing resources for this process for us and many churches.

 Now we come to current times and the real impetus for our current study and journey through the Open and Affirming process within Church on the Hill. On June 12, 2016, 49 people were gunned down and murdered, and many more were injured, while they were enjoying an evening out socializing in the Pulse Nightclub in Orlando. The next day Sunday morning, Pastor Tom spoke emotionally about this event. At the next meeting, the Vision Ministry decided to pursue the ONA study with appointment of a lay sub-committee. This video from soon after reminds us of how most people felt - both angry and helpless in the aftermath. The UCC General Minister and President, the Rev. John Dorhauer, addresses those gathered in Orlando with a huge supporting crowd of clergy with him.

- In Florida, approximately half of our UCC churches are already Open and Affirming. Our sub-committee met with representatives from 4 ONA churches - Ft. Lauderdale UCC, Church of the Palms in Delray Beach, Lake Worth UCC, and Union Congregational in WPB. We asked for their advice about what types of education and discussion we should be sure to include. Reviewing 6 or so verses from the Bible was universally important.
- Let's first review some facts about how people read and understand the Bible.

- The Bible is a book of theology and stories to explain faith
- The Bible is not a history book, though it does have some historical facts, but it also has legends and parables that are not historically provable - it is often studied as a book of literature, since it contains many poems, prose and songs.
- The Bible is not a Science text book
- When a person reads the Bible, how they understand it is based on their life experience, their social status, sexual orientation, age, cultural background and other considerations.
- If one understands Greek, Latin, or Aramaic languages, he/she can get a very different meaning than those of us who only read American English.

- We will see 2 videos that interpret some of the more difficult verses. These verses have been used since the 1800's to try to make homosexual persons feel less worthy than heterosexual persons to be included in God's kingdom. The videos have similar content, but explained a bit differently.
- During the second video we will pause between sections to add a bit more context about the times that they were written. We will try to picture what those societies were like, and how the Jews were to be set apart in the ways they lived from the Greeks and ruling Roman pagan-worshipping societies.

What the Bible Says and Doesn't Say about Homosexuality
Rev. Dr. William M. Lyons, St. John's United Church of Christ, Grand Rapids, MI workshop: "What the Bible Really Says About Gay Christians (may surprise you)" quoted from Dr. Lyons' workshop:

We have considered a number of Old Testament passages, and several passages from the New Testament - the writings from the earliest Christians that were given the same authority by the Church as the Hebrew Scriptures. When we buy a Bible or Tanahk we might think the writings in the book were always considered the Word of God. That is not the case. The Jewish canon or list of authoritative books we call the Old Testament was formulated over a 400 year period, from 200 BCE to 200 CE, by Jewish rabbis and scholars. That formulation was in process during the life of Jesus and the first two centuries of the church's life. It took between 250 and 300 years for Christians to arrive at the list of writings we call the New Testament. Even as late as the 16th century Martin Luther was challenging the validity of some of the New Testament writings as God's Word, the Book of James in particular, related to the Protestant Reformation. Jews and Christians alike believe that God was actively involved in the processes used for determining the lists of authoritative books.

• Our effort in interpreting the sacred text we summarily call the Bible stands in a long history of God's people endeavoring to hear God's voice for their lives for their day.

from Andy Lang and Rod Mundy of LGBT Coalition's The Bible and ONA webinar I learned:

In the Bible are 31,000 verses - there are 8 or fewer verses that MAY condemn same sex relations; = .02% of Bible.

Often folks have fear of people who seem different to them, or have heard prejudices about the "other." Let's get to know people as **people**, not being concerned about sexual orientation.

from UCC web site:

- The Bible both unites and divides us as a church. Our spiritual ancestors have never agreed, even in the first generations of the Christian community, about the right way to read and apply scripture.
- What about scriptural authority?
- Scripture is often quoted by all sides in ethical conflicts that divide us.
- Dr. Bernice Powell-Jackson of Tampa UCC suggests: What if we see the Bible as God's gift to the church, to be read for our instruction and comfort rather than as a hammer used to strike down the arguments our opponents or to exclude each other from the body of Christ?
- to quote The Rev. John Thomas, former UCC General Minister and President: "To begin taking the Bible seriously is to approach it expectantly, to honor its transparency and to discover that it not only discloses God, the word made flesh [but] it also strips us bare before that same word to portray us in all our grandeur and all our depravity. So, in a peculiar way, the Bible is both divine revelation and human disclosure."

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What the Bible Says and Doesn't Say about Homosexuality

Rev. Dr. William M. Lyons, St. John's United Church of Christ, Grand Rapids, MI workshop: "What the Bible Really Says About Gay Christians (may surprise you)" quoted from Dr. Lyons' workshop:

The laws in Leviticus 19 are based on the holiness of God and are designed to help Israel reflect the nature of their God. Leviticus chapter 20 prescribes the punishments for breaking the laws in both of these chapters. God does not offer a statement condemning Israel's neighbors for doing the very things from which they are commanded to abstain; God simply says that for Israel, these things ought not to be done so that they are different from their neighbors.

Christians long ago stopped interpreting many of these regulations, often called "Holiness or Purity Codes" literally. We no longer put to death those who curse their parents or commit adultery, nor do we excommunicate those who consult horoscopes/mediums. Consistent application of these verses is important; selective enforcement has no legitimacy. Consensual homosexual relationships do not appear to be in view. This law could legitimately be read as a prohibition of heterosexual people engaging in homosexual conduct. **However the law was read, the understanding of sexuality being an orientation was not a lens through which the ancients could consider the text.** Because the articulated purpose of the Law at the beginning of these chapters was to distinguish ancient Israel from the cultures around them, making them a set-apart people, it may very well be that no moral judgment on the sexual behaviors mentioned is intended. These laws may simply be a way to distinguish God's people from the people around them. For the Christian, the mark of our being set apart from the people around us or being holy is the Holy Spirit in our lives (Ephesians 1:13, 4:30), not the observance of laws.

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Rev. Dr. William M. Lyons, St. John's United Church of Christ, Grand Rapids, MI workshop: "What the Bible Really Says About Gay Christians (may surprise you)" quoted from Dr. Lyons' workshop:

We might ask -

- How Do We Do Our Relationships?
- How do we live in relationships: with God, with one another, with the rest of creation, and with ourselves? How we live out one relationship impacts all of our relationships. Let's explore some basic Bible information about our relationships.
 - Not Good to Be Alone
 - And then for the first time God said something was NOT good. "It is not good for the man to be alone. I will make him a partner as his partner." (Genesis 2:18) For the man, the absence of being in relationship with creatures worthy of partnership was less than pleasant, advantageous, and prosperous. God included the man in the process of discerning a way to overcome that which was not good (aloneness) with something that was good (partnership). God invited Adam to name and evaluate the creatures that had been made each as to their worthiness for partnership with him. (Genesis 2:19-20) When a suitable partner was not found for the man among the other creatures, God continued creating.

quotes from Dr. Lyons - continued

How interesting to note that God couldn't complete his creating work without the input from the creature created in the divine image. There was room in all that God had done for further growth and development that included the participation of the human being. ...and to humanity (the only creature made in God's image) God also gave the responsibility of being the steward of all that God had made – caring for it and striving to bring it to its full potential. Through these creative and blessing activities, God created meaning, responsibility, and accountability through the experience of partnership, stewardship, and sexual relationships. The writer of Genesis understood these blessings and relationships to apply to all human beings (including their offspring), not just the creatures created directly by God. When God surveyed all that had happened in the six days, God pronounced all that had been made and all of the processes that had been set into motion as **good**.

- Dr Bernice (Tampa UCC workshop) adds There is one rule which Jesus said is above all others the commandment to love that is what we should follow when in doubt.
 - That commandment to love was about being in right relationship with God and with each other.

 I want to wrap up with positive themes from Jesus and the Bible. Before I attended Earlham my sister graduated from and worked for Earlham, I went to meetings in Cincinnati with my convinced Quaker grandmother, my maternal great-grandfather was a birthright Quaker, and my parents became convinced Quakers about the time I began college. I have many good experiences about the Quaker-way as I know it. In my parents' meeting they welcome gay members and one member I met was becoming a male to female transgender person. In this video a gay Quaker-Christian explains how she is comforted and made to feel free and loved. Let's listen to Kody's testimony.

Questions asked during the seminar, with answers provided

Q = Question; A = Answer, there are several parts to some answers

Phrases, Scriptures in Italics were added or expanded upon after the seminar.

Written Questions Submitted

- 1. Q: In reference to the story of Sodom and Gomorrah, in the book of Genesis the stories of gang rape and how it was averted shows that even in the Bible, women were treated as property or chattel, to be bartered away like oxen or pigs or sheep. So sad. I don't think the Lord accepted this as normal [behavior], no matter what age it occurs in.
 - A. Thankfully we're mostly beyond that in our society today, but not in some other societies around the world. In reference to the treatment of women, I would add that sex slave trade certainly does still exist in the U.S. and in many other countries and cultures around he world.
- 2. Q: Does the Bible even condemn FEMALE Homosexuality? (Paul seems to poke fun at it, but never gets around to condemning it.)
 - A. The only woman with woman reference is in Romans, but NOT talking about same sex committed relationships. Paul points out sexual and other behaviors related to pagan and idol worship, and the need to worship only God and not man-created gods. From The Letter of Paul to the Romans: (pg. 152 NRSV (Church on the Hill's Bible version) Ch. 1, verses 18-28: "For the wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and wickedness of those who by their wickedness suppress the truth. 19 For what can be known about God is plain to them, because God has shown it to them. 20 Ever since the creation of the world his eternal power and divine nature, invisible though they are, have been understood and seen through the things he has made. So they are without excuse; 21 for though they knew God, they did not honor him as God or give thanks to him, but they became futile in their thinking, and their senseless minds were darkened. 22 Claiming to be wise, they became fools; 23 and they exchanged the glory of the immortal God for images resembling a mortal human being or birds or four-footed

animals or reptiles.24 There God gave them up in the lusts of their hearts to impurity, to the degrading of their bodies among themselves, 25 because they exchanged the truth about God for a lie and worshiped and served the creature rather than the Creator, who is blessed forever! Amen. 26 For this reason God gave them up to degrading passions. Their women exchanged natural intercourse for unnatural, 27 and in the same way also the men, giving up natural intercourse with women, were consumed with passion for one another. Men committed shameless acts with men and received in their own persons the due penalty for their error. 28 And since they did not see fit to acknowledge God, God gave them up to a debased mind and to things that should not be done."

- 3. Q: How about Jesus curing the Centurion's slave?
 - A. That was one I missed, so I did more research in Matthew Ch. 8, 5: When he entered Capernaum, a centurion come to him, appealing to him 6 and saying, "Lord, my servant is lying at home paralyzed, in terrible distress." 7 And he said to him, "I will come and cure him." 8 The centurion answered, "Lord, I am not worthy to have you come under my roof; but only speak the word, and my servant will be healed. 9 For I also am a man under authority, with soldiers under me; and I say to one, 'Go,' and he goes, and to another, 'Come,' and he comes, and to my slave, 'Do this,' and the slave does it." 10 When Jesus heard him, he was amazed and said to those who followed him, "Truly I tell you, in no one in Israel have I found such faith. 11 I tell you, many will come from east and west and will eat with Abraham and Isaac and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven, 12 while the heirs of the kingdom will be thrown into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth." 13 And to the centurion Jesus said, "Go; let it be done for you according to your faith." And the servant was healed in that hour.
- 4. Q: What Bible verses can we use to share with others who are adamant that homosexuality is a sin and against God's will?
 - A. Focus on scriptures of love. Believing in a loving God whose greatest commandments include love, how can exclusion be His way? For expanded answers, see i. through ix. below:

- i. Getting to know someone who is Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, or Transgender is the best way to realize that all people are made in God's image, and God indicated that all creation was GOOD.
- ii. Matthew 7:12 "In everything do to others as you would have them do to you; for this is the law and the prophets."
- iii. Romans Ch. 13, 8-10: "Owe no one anything except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. 9 The commandments, 'You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet'; and any other commandment are summed up in this word, 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' 10 Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law."
- iv. Romans Ch. 15, verse 7: "Welcome one another, therefore, just as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God."
- v. "There are 31,000 verses in the Bible; of these perhaps 8 speak against same-sex sexual relations, which equals. 02% of the Bible. Sex acts and sexual relations are not the same thing as committed, consensual loving relationships." from ONA and the Bible Webinar, LGBT Coalition.
- vi. God is always with me.
- vii. Love thy neighbor as God has loved you.
- viii. Dr. Jerry Stephensen's book, "Out of the Closet and Into the Light" reminds that Jesus commands us to reach out to others in need. Our brothers and sisters who have been turned away from family relationships, attending certain churches, or even deserving a right-relationship with God would certainly include many people in the LGBT community, who might accept a welcoming invitation to come and be fully part of a church family.
 - 1. Dr. Stephenson, page 37: "But the church again fails to reach out to those in need. When the church does

- not reach out, they seem to only condemn and play God."
- 2. ...and page 55: "Nowhere does the BIBLE or JESUS CHRIST condemn or damn Gays/Lesbians (John 3:17; Matthew 10:11-15;). It is here we see God's Mercy Forgiveness and Love, which is the Gospel Message. The hope for Gay/Lesbian Christians is in Jesus Christ and not in man. The Apostle Paul puts it this way: 'For I am convinced that neither death nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, not things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other created thing, shall be able to separate me from the Love of God, which is in CHRIST JESUS my LORD"

Oral questions and comments from seminar on 2/12/18

- 5. Q: Thinking about "abomination" and what this means
 - A. All of the references in Leviticus relate to the purity code as rules for the Jews to be separate from their Pagan neighbors and the Pagan religious and idol worship practices of that era. Abomination referred to purity codes and rituals as a means to separate the Jews from the Pagans. MANY behaviors were considered as abominations, or highly disgusting, outrageous, disgraceful, and at times punishable by death.
- 6. Q: Question seeking clarification regarding the Sodom & Gomorrah story.
 - A. We read our own personal biases into scripture. Rape of both men and women was and in some places still today is a method of war and humiliation and subjugation of outsiders and of defeated others. Kingdom of God as all accepted.
- 7. COMMENT: There seems to be a generational connection among issues of segregation, equal rights for racial and gender issues, and currently for immigration. Regarding the topics of the purpose of sex, segregation, and civil rights, it feels like one theme is similar across all these issues. Just an observation. This [ONA] is a good process for our church to go through.
- 8. COMMENT: How much social justice you read into the Bible depends on how you want to read it.
